BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Earring with ram's head

The god Amun was often portrayed as a ram and both were associated with creativity and virility. Earrings were worn by men and women, both in life and after death, and were made in many different shapes, using a variety of materials. Gold was commonly used, as were inlays of precious stones and glass. The Egyptians were excellent goldsmiths. Gold was valued in ancient Egypt as a precious metal, and was associated with the gods, particularly the sun god, because of its warm reflective qualities.

DISCUSS

Earring with ram's head

In ancient Egypt, both men and women wore jewelry. The color, form, and materials used can can tell us about the person who originally wore the jewelry. This earring takes the form of the head of a ram (male sheep), which was associated with the god Amun and was connected with creativity, vigorous strength, and masculinity.

Roll your cursor over the image of the earring to magnify.

- · What details do you see?
- What details indicate that this was made to look like a ram's head?
- How do you think it was made?
- What do you think this earring says about the person who wore it?
- Do you think that what you wear says something about you?
- What do you like to wear?
- What do your clothes and accessories say about you?
